Bringing Fido Home

So . . . you have taken your new pooch home!

Here are some helpful tips to help him or her to adjust to you and a new home.

- Build a bond . . . hand feed your puppy or adult dog during meal times the first week.
- Let them explore . . . on lead, walk them around the perimeter of your yard, back and front, so they realize what THEIR territory is.
- Bevelop a schedule . . . put them on a schedule. Your schedule, not theirs. Be as consistent as possible with potty breaks, playtime, walks, and feeding time.
- 4 EXERCISE, EXERCISE, EXERCISE
- Put them to work . . . give them something to do when you are gone to work. Toys, bones, or perhaps doggy day care. Boredom can be quite destructive.
- Develop a relationship . . . dogs are companion animals. They want and desire to be with their person. Give them plenty of attention. Make time for them. Take them with you when you can. We make time for any relationship we want in our lives....our dog should be no different.
- Be committed . . . owning a dog is a commitment. You are your dog's caretaker. They depend on you for their happiness and well-being.

Volunteer Spotlight: Dr. Margarita Perez

You would never believe that Dr. Margarita Perez was once shy around dogs. That all changed on a bright and beautiful day in 2000 when she started volunteering at Capital Humane Society. She's now a licensed veterinarian and her perspective on dogs has changed immensely from the days as a fresh college graduate. Dr. Perez graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University with a bachelors degree in Biology and Medical Technology. She then worked at the University of Nebraska Vet Diagnostic Lab for seven years in the bacteriology lab.

Dr. Perez volunteered 4-5 years with the pet assisted therapy program along with off-site events for the shelter. Her favorite part of volunteering was meeting the residents of the nursing homes and hearing about their pets.

Dr. Perez was accepted into the vet school at Iowa State in 2005 and graduated in 2009. She currently works at the Emergency Vet in Lincoln and also does relief work for other local vet clinics. Dr. Perez and her husband Hari, of 19 years, own two black CHS shelter cats: Nefertiti and Buckbeak. In her spare time, Dr. Perez enjoys doing word games with friends, geocaching and browsing the internet for vet information and U.S. Supreme Court cases.

Dr. Perez returned to Capital Humane Society as a volunteer in 2011 working with the vet staff three days each week. She assists with health exams, spay and neuter surgeries, micro-chipping, de-worming, and medicating, among other things. Dr. Perez said she felt like she gained so much experience at the shelter from 2000-2005 and volunteering was such an integral part of getting into vet school. This is her way of giving back for helping her to achieve her goal to practice veterinarian medicine. Capital Humane Society loves her way of thinking and we are very appreciative of her giving so much of herself to help out our shelter animals.

New Year's Resolutions for the Dog Owner

New Year's is a good time to take stock of ways to help your dog become healthier and happier. The following are resolutions for pet owners to help ensure their pets live a long, healthy life.

Resolution No. 1: I will take my dog on regular walks. Exercise is good for the mental and physical well-being of you and your dog. Many of the health problems that dogs have are related to being overweight. The extra pounds lead to added stress on bones and joints, plus, can contribute to certain metabolic diseases. Also, many behavioral problems stem from a lack of exercise. A good walk can make you and your dog feel better!

Resolution No. 2: I will not feed my dog table food. A good quality diet provides all of the nutrients that your pet needs. If you give your pet table food you may be contributing to weight gain and possibly causing other health problems like diarrhea and pancreatitis.

Resolution No. 3: I will brush my dog's teeth. Oral disease can be a significant cause of health problems in pets. Accumulation of plaque and calculus leads to gum inflammation. This can lead to painful gum and tooth problems, and possibly kidney and heart disease. Brushing your dog's teeth, even once a week, can help slow dental disease. An added benefit is fresh smelling doggie breath!! Ask your veterinarian for a brushing demonstration.

Resolution No. 4: I will play with my dog. Spend time with your dog. Resolve to have playtime 10 to 15 minutes a day. Simply chasing a tennis ball or tugging a rope makes your dog feel special and creates a bonding moment for you both.

Resolution No. 5: I will put an end to my dog's behavior problems. Nothing prevents an owner from enjoying his dog like persistent behavior problems. Identify any issues — from urinating in the house to begging for table food — that keep you from fully appreciating your pet. Consult with a dog behaviorist or trainer on how to eliminate the behavior. With some consistent behavior training, many problems can be changed in a few weeks.

Resolution No. 6: I will help myself while helping my pet. While you're making resolutions that will benefit your dog, why not think about yourself too?

- Guarantee your pet-related financial health by starting a pet savings fund. Stock away a little money each month in case of a pet emergency.
- Get organized. Clean out old, dirty toys that neither you nor your dog enjoy.
- Make sure your dog has adequate ID, either on its collar or in the form of a microchip. If your pup is regularly on the run, this will help reduce your stress levels.
- Do a good deed: Consider taking in a foster dog. Inquire at a local shelter about good matches for your current pet.
