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## **Family Matters**

On May 5th, 2016 we received two Beagle/Dachshund mixes named Holly & Hana when their previous owner surrendered them to us. Upon arrival both girls, which we believe are sisters, were pregnant!

Our veterinary staff checked them over to make sure they were healthy and able to carry their litters to term. We looked for a foster home for them but this proved difficult because neither one cared to be around any other dogs except for each other. In the meantime, we decided to move them to a quieter housing situation at the Pieloch Pet Adoption Center until a foster home could be located for both of them. While they were at the Pieloch Pet Adoption Center they gave birth to their litters a week apart and both gave birth to five puppies!

Shortly after they gave birth to their litters, we located an awesome foster home for each mother and their puppies where the puppies could nurse, grow, and be weaned. While in foster care Holly & Hana were amazing mothers as they cared for their litters till they were big enough to come back to the shelter and be placed up for adoption. In late July, all ten puppies were adopted and found their new homes!

Holly & Hana were reunited in the same foster home after the puppies returned to the shelter so they could dry up before their spay surgeries. They were very happy to be reunited and we knew we needed to try to find a home for them to stay together! On August 9th, they were adopted and found their new home where they could stay together!

Capital Humane Society will enter its 115th year saving lives and sheltering animals in Lincoln and Lancaster County in 2017. We provide care for over 6,500 animals each year including dogs, cats, rabbits, hamsters, pigs, chickens and even a mule this last year! The high level of quality care, shelter and TLC that we provide would not be possible without you. We feed them, medicate them and keep them safe. Your donations no matter if they are big or small, in-kind or the gift of time, help save lives of homeless pets.

In a year, just for cats, it is estimated we use:

**10,000** pounds of cat food that costs **\$13,000** 

**1,600** microchips cost **\$16,000** 

**6,000** doses of vaccines cost **\$45,000** 

**55,000** pounds of litter cost **\$10,000**

# Message from the President & CEO


As the holidays come around again I am once more reminded of how generous the community is to Capital Humane Society. We are truly a fortunate organization.

# Winter Tips for Your Pets

Winter can be a delightful time of the year. Trees are covered in white fluffy snow and the air is crisp and quiet. Winter can also be a difficult time of the year. Snow and ice make venturing outside dangerous. The cold air makes it hard to breath and our animals can feel the pain of winter just as we do. Here are some tips to keep your furry friends safe and warm this winter.

- When using ice melt check to make sure it is pet friendly. Some salts can burn paws if left on the skin Rinse off your pet's paws after being exposed to ice melt to reduce the chance of burns.
- Check your pet for ice or snow stuck in their paws or fur. This can cause irritation and lead to wounds.
- Short walks multiple times during the day are better than long strolls in the bitter cold. Walking when it is the warmest part of the day will help make your outing more enjoyable.
- Winter coats and booties can be purchased for pets that need extra layers in the winter. For animals not accustomed to wearing clothes, it may take them time to become acclimated to their new wardrobe.
- We encourage all pets to be brought inside during the bitter cold months. If your pets must stay outside, please make sure they have a warm dry place to stay. Fresh water also needs to be available to pets outside. Heated bowls can help prevent water from freezing.
- Make sure to check your vehicle before starting it. Cats and other small animals can climb up near the engine of your car seeking warmth.
