From Despair to Hope



One day in March a young man was practicing at a shooting range near Pawnee Lake. He was surprised to find a cat abandoned in a nearby closed dumpster. The sheriff's office called Capital Humane Society to the rescue. Our on-call staff went "dumpster diving" and brought the cat to the shelter. We were very concerned that she wasn't eating and were

sickened to learn why. Our vet exams and x-rays revealed that she had been shot. She had a wound through her nose and tongue, exiting the bottom of her mouth. Also, one paw was swollen and bloody.

The kitty was named "Hope" – for we all hoped that with extra care she would beat the odds and survive this despairing experience.

Her wounds were repaired surgically, but to allow her to survive the healing time needed for her mouth, a feeding tube was inserted. We housed her in a rolling kennel in one of our offices, so she would have quiet (a rare commodity in a shelter). For weeks our animal care staff carefully fed her through the tube. Amazingly, through it all Hope never lost her trust in or affection for people. She always shared a purr, nudge or a gentle meow to anyone passing by. As she

gained strength, she decided she should take over the office, perching on a chair, the desk or in the middle of the room soaking up the afternoon sunlight.

After 5 weeks of rehabilitation, Hope was eating on her own and was ready to begin a new life in an adoptive home. One of our volunteers fell for Hope and offered a home with her very own padded window seat. Now Hope's life is filled with all the things a cat expects . . . a warm and secure environment, along with plenty of love and attention.

Summer Cat Care

Cats do not get a vacation from the dog days of summer, and they need your help to keep summertime problems at a minimum. Even though many cats have the luxury of living indoors in a comfy air conditioned house, these cats are also affected by some of the changes that warmer weather brings. Cats that spend some, if not all of their time outdoors, need even more care to keep them healthy. The following tips are to help you keep your cat healthy if he lives indoors or outdoors.



Make sure your cat always has clean fresh water available.



Never leave your cat in a locked car.

Grooming is very important. Cats tend to shed more in the summer. Keeping them brushed out on a regular basis will decrease shedding and therefore; make it less likely that they will vomit hair balls. A healthy hair coat keeps them warm in the winter and cool in the summer.

Check with your veterinarian to make sure your cat's vaccinations are current. All cats should have an annual fecal sample to test for parasites. This is especially important for outdoor cats; in fact, "hunters" may need deworming 2 times per year. Your veterinarian can make the best recommendations for your cat.



A special word about outdoor cats. Obviously the outside world has many potential dangers for a cat. However, providing good preventative healthcare, as previously discussed, will help decrease some of the risks. In addition, make sure your cat has a means of identification. Tags with a break-away collar or a microchip are both adequate forms of ID. If you use a microchip, make sure your contact information is current

with the manufacturer. or registry.



Summer Safety



Summer is a great time of the year! We spend as much time outdoors as we can, soaking up the sun, working in the yard, playing in the park and going to the lake. All of these activities may or may not include our faithful friend by our side. During the summer months you can keep your pet safe by following these simple rules:

Don't let your pet ride in an open truck bed sudden stops and starts can toss your pet onto the highway causing serious injury.

- Keep your dogs head and paws inside the car wind can seriously irritate mucous membranes and blow pieces of grit or pebbles into their eyes.
- Check your pet's collar you should be able to slip two or three fingers between the pet's collar and neck. Tighter than this can cause pain or trouble breathing.
- Identification make sure the city license and rabies tags are on your pet's collar. This makes for easy identification if your pet should wander from home.
- - Keep your cat indoors avoid outdoor dangers and parasites by keeping your cat safely indoors.
- Be aware of extreme temperatures heat exhaustion is often caused by leaving pets in parked cars or over-exercising pets during hot weather.

Carly's time at Capital Humane Society was much longer than 15 minutes though. She made her way into the shelter after being lost in a city park. CHS did its best to find Carly's own-

er, but no one reclaimed her. The CHS staff fell in love with her bubbly personality, especially Director of Operations Pat Williams. So much in fact that Pat decided to foster the puppy until she was ready for adoption. Carly was born with two cherry eyes (prolapsed lower eyelids) and needed corrective surgery, which CHS provided.



During her recooperation, the pup fit in well with Pat's pack. Carly's ability to love and trust everything around her made it easy. It was hard for Pat to bring Carly back, but she knew the pooch would find a home in no time at all. Little did we know that it would only be fifteen minutes.

Since adopting Carly, her owner has kindly brought her in to visit the shelter a couple of times. Each visit is like a homecoming, as the little dog seems to remember the people who helped her when she was in need.

This lost puppy's story is one of the many reminders why we are truly passionate about animal welfare.
