## Skittles Pack

Earlier this year, Skittles, a Dachshund mix, was found by a citizen and left in our overnight kennels at the Admissions & Assessment Center. After her previous family did not claim her, we began the process to get her ready for the adoption program. During her health assessment, we learned she was pregnant and an ultrasound confirmed she was indeed carrying a litter of puppies!

Skittles was moved into our foster care program so she could be comfortable as she carried her pups. About three weeks after she arrived, she gave birth to seven puppies! Unfortunately, two of the puppies did not make it but over the next two months Skittles nursed and raised her five puppies in her foster home until they were big enough to find homes of their own. We are extremely grateful to have amazing foster parents willing to provide care for animals like Skittles and her puppies!

In mid September, the puppies were ready for adoption and went to our Pieloch Pet Adoption Center. They all found new, loving families in no time at all! About a month later, Skittles also went up for adoption and quickly found her new family! Because of support from donors like you, we can help pets like Skittles and her puppies!



#### From The President & CEO

Looking back to January of 1984 when I began work for Capital Humane Society, I have to marvel at the difference we are able to make for pets being placed up for adoption. At that time, placing a pet up for adoption meant possibly giving it a bath and then moving it from the restricted area of the shelter into the adoption area of the shelter. Nothing more. We employed no veterinary staff and had no facilities on-site for veterinary care.

Today, we employ a full-time veterinarian, a half-time veterinarian, and three full-time licensed veterinary technicians. Facility wise, we have a surgery room with two tables, another surgery room with one table, a pre and post surgery room for cats, the same for dogs, a second recovery room for cats, an exam room for both species, and a full dental room. Obviously, preparing pets for adoption is more sophisticated today and we are able to offer adopters a healthier new member of the family.

By the end of 2019, we will have performed 2,670 spay/neuter surgeries and 330 other surgeries including dental surgeries, broken bone repairs, hernia repairs, amputations, and more. That was all in just one year and none of this happens without the support we receive from our donors. Thank you for making all of this possible.

I would like to close by wishing you a wonderful holiday season and a prosperous 2020!

Last year, more than 3,000 pets were adopted from Capital Humane Society. Cathy Beltz is one of our outstanding volunteer adoption counselors. She helps match pets in need with the people who adopt them and give them a forever home.

"When Cathy walks in, we all know our day will be better," said lead animal care staff, Natsumi Rosenau. "She helps with adoptions and all kinds of tasks including laundry and dishes! Her bubbly vibe brightens our day."

"I love working with families who are looking for their perfect companion," Cathy explained. "In discussing what the family's situation is, we can find the perfect pet for them, where both the family and their new pet will be happy."

Adoption counselors review each pet's medical and behavior history, then educate potential adopters about what the animal will need in a new home. They also provide handouts with useful information on topics such as house-training, working with a fearful pet, the importance of establishing a routine, and how to do proper introductions with existing pets.

It takes patience and attention to detail to be an adoption counselor. In addition to those qualities, Cathy brings positive energy and kindheartedness to her volunteer service.

"It is amazing how Cathy interacts with customers," Natsumi said. "They all end up with a big smile on their face."

The days are very busy at Capital Humane Society and the animal care staff do everything from cleaning, feeding, medicating and animal enrichment to customer service. Cathy said she has witnessed the dedication of the staff and is impressed. We are so grateful for her willingness to lighten the load by coming in to volunteer two or more times each week.

Cathy helps in other ways too.
