## Alopecia

You came into the Pieloch Adoption Center and found your new furry friend, thank you very much by the way, and you go home and notice some hair thinning or areas of hair loss. The big doctor word for this, as I like to say, is "alopecia." If this occurs, don't hesitate to give us a call and inquire, as this can happen. Here are some of the most common scenarios that happen in the shelter world.
Flea allergy dermatitis (FAD) is very common and is characterized by hair thinning or hair loss over the tail head region. These animals are actually allergic to flea saliva. All pets are treated for fleas upon arrival at the shelter and may be in the process
of growing their hair back. Occasionally another treatment application may be indicated.
Many of our animals may have incurred minor injuries or dermatitis prior to arrival. All of these conditions are addressed upon intake.
There will be instances where flare-ups occur and we are happy to extend their course of treatment in those cases.
Sometimes, although quite rare, kittens may present with hair loss on their toes, ears, and face post adoption. These kittens are suspects for ringworm (which is actually a fungus).
These situations occur because there may be spores on the kitten or in the environment. Most cats are actually carriers of ringworm spores but do not exhibit symptoms. However, coming to the shelter can be stressful for a cat or kitten. The change of surroundings of coming to the shelter, other animals, new sounds, new smells, surgery to be sterilized, and then new surroundings of a new home can incur stress, which causes their immune system to weaken. Therefore, occasionally ringworm can develop post adoption even though there were no lesions or symptoms prior to going home. If this were to occur, please call with these cases and we can help get them back to health.
